

1. Call to Order

Acting-Chair Harrison called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

1.1 Election of the Chair and Vice-Chair

S. Moore reviewed the names of all Members who had expressed interest in the Chair and Vice-Chair positions. L. Harrison spoke briefly on his interest in taking on the role of Committee Vice-Chair. S. Moore read words prepared by C. Ramnauth expressing his interest in the Committee Chair position.

That Cecil Ramnauth be appointed Chair and Lee Harrison be appointed Vice-Chair of the Diversity & Community Engagement Advisory Committee until January 27, 2016, at which time appointments will be reviewed by the Committee.

4. Presentation/Discussion

Items 4.1 and 4.2 were combined.

4.1 National Access Awareness Week 2015

Carion Fenn, Accessibility Advisory Committee Member and Marcia Bowen, Accessibility Advisory Committee Vice-Chair, presented an overview of Rick Hansen's accessibility legacy and the origin of National Access Awareness Week recognition. The tenth anniversary of Ontario's Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act legislation was noted. The Town will recognize May 31 to June 6, 2015 as National Access Awareness Week (NAAW), which will include several activities for the community. The Committee will be hosting a presentation to local elementary school students by Paralympian and Parapan Am Games tennis athlete Joel Dembe to kick off NAAW. The Committee will also be hosting its second-annual Accessibility Awareness Night in partnership with the Ajax Public Library on Thursday, June 4, 2015 from 6-8 p.m.

M. Bowen noted that the event has expanded in its second year to include over 14 stations comprised of information booths, activities and try-its for the community to explore. The event will be attended by local community organizations in support of accessibility, including: Durham Mental Health Services, Autism Ontario, Grandview Kids, Canadian Hearing Society, Abilities Centre, Durham Transit Specialized Services, and the CNIB. Attendees who complete an All-access passport by visiting the stations will be entered into a draw for one of two accessibility prize packs. M. Bowen encouraged the Committee to attend. All attendees will receive a packet of seeds of understanding, because when we appreciate the unique gifts inside people of all abilities, everyone grows and inclusion is cultivated.

With consent of all Members present, a presentation from the Black History Month Organizing Committee was added to the agenda.

4.2 Black History Month Organizing Committee

Cayla Da Silva introduced Esther Forde and Dane Lawrence, members of the Black History Month Organizing Committee, who were in attendance to speak to the Committee about the Black History Month celebrations in Ajax. 2017 will mark the 10th anniversary of the Committee's program, having grown from a reception in the Cultural Expressions Art Gallery to an annual event held at the J. Clarke Richardson theatre including performances, food and a community information fair. E. Forde noted that the event is recognized beyond Ajax and attended by approximately 600 participants. A slide show of previous Black History Month celebration events was shared with the Committee.

D. Lawrence noted that the Committee partners with a wide variety of community organizations including the Durham District School Board, Black Educators Network, Congress of Black Women, Durham Regional Police Services, and the Town of Ajax to name a few. D. Lawrence highlighted several of the events' past keynote speakers and spoke about the "Championing Our Future" campaign that showcases youth within the community. The Championing Our Future video was shared for the Committee.

Vice-Chair Harrison inquired what role the Committee could play in assisting with the Black History Month's efforts. E. Forde emphasized the importance of communications and awareness of the events, noting that assistance with social media is appreciated. On behalf of the Committee, Vice-Chair Harrison, requested that the Committee be added to the email distribution list to keep informed of upcoming events. Regional Councillor Jordan commended E. Forde and D. Lawrence for their continued contributions and efforts towards the recognition of Black History Month within the community.

4.3 Pan Am Games Overview Panel

- C. Da Silva introduced the panel of guests in attendance to provide several updates on the Pan Am Games and their impact to Ajax and Durham Region. Panelists included Tracey Vaughan-Barrett, Director of Recreation and Culture, Laura Tegelberg, Pan Am Volunteer Coordinator, Vanessa Bilenduke from Community Development Council Durham and herself.
- T. Vaughan noted that the Toronto 2015 Pan/Parapan Am Games will be the largest multisport games ever hosted in Canada and will include participation from 41 countries July 10 26, 2015 with the Parapan Am Games running August 7 15, 2015. She reviewed the Games' footprint, noting that Ajax will be hosting baseball and softball events, with Whitby hosting Parapan Events and Oshawa hosting weightlifting and boxing. Pachi the porcupine was introduced as the Games' mascot.
- L. Tegelberg presented an overview of volunteer management for the Games, noting that Toronto 2015 requires volunteers separate from the Town's volunteers, which are known as Pan Am-Bassadors. Approximately 400-500 volunteers are required in Ajax throughout the duration of the Games. As a legacy piece, the Town has acquired volunteer management software (Better Impact) that will provide shared licensing throughout the Corporation for improved volunteer management. She reviewed the various volunteer positions noting Team Leads, Diversity & Inclusion Ambassadors, Bike Corral Attendants, Information Kiosk Attendants, Mobile Community Ambassadors, and events volunteers. Over 1,500 volunteer shifts will be allocated throughout the duration of the Games. L. Tegelberg spoke to the innovative recruitment and screening methods employed, volunteer training, as well as the content of the Volunteer kits.

T. Vaughan-Barrett discussed Festivals & Events related to the Pan Am Games, including the two-year and one-year countdown celebrations, information booths, a float in the Town's Santa Claus Parade, Torch Relay, opening ceremonies viewing party, closing ceremonies, Parapan Torch Relay and community thank-you. Annual events such as Kids in the Square, Music in the Square and Movies in the Park will all align with Pan Am themes as well. The Town's four selected torch bearers were identified.

C. Da Silva and V. Bilenduke acknowledged that the Town in partnership with the Ajax Welcome Centre and other community partners will open the Ajax Pride House during the Pan Am Games. Ajax Pride House is a dedicated temporary location that offers a safe space for the LGBTQ community and allies to watch the Games, celebrate the sport & culture of the Games, network, and participate in topical events. V. Bilenduke reviewed the event calendar in detail noting activities will include panel discussions, film screenings, family BBQ events, networking, refreshments and youth group meetings. V. Bilenduke sought suggestions from the Committee on additional programming ideas. The Committee was encouraged to identify any events/activities it would like to host or be part of.

The panel concluded their presentation with the screening of the Pan Am United We Play video.

5. Correspondence

S. Moore shared details relative to the opportunity for Committee Members to attend the Gala of Hope Dinner organized by the Women's Multicultural Resource and Counselling Centre of Durham on Saturday May 30, 2015. Information relative to the Town's flag raising ceremony in recognition of PRIDE Week Durham scheduled for Monday, June 1, 2015 was noted. T. Vaughan provided details relative to ticket availability for a free Deceiving Divas drag show event on June 4, 2015 being held at the Ajax Legion.

6. Update from Council

Regional Councillor Jordan informed the Committee that she had been appointed as the Ajax representative to sit on a special committee to review the fair representation on Regional Council.
