**1. Welcome and Call Meeting to Order by Chairman:**

Chair Todd Bennett called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

**7. Business Arising from the Minutes:**

**i.) A brief verbal update with respect to FOTENN Planning's Concept Planning Initiative completed steps for the Paris Holdings Inc. Lands (former Domtar Main Mill) since the September 15 & 19, Waterfront & PAC meetings (i.e. Developers Meetings and upcoming 1st Non-Planning Act Public Meeting Open House) - Ken Bedford, Supervisor of Planning Division**

Ken Bedford advised that Fotenn Planning and Design on behalf of Paris Holdings Inc., have scheduled a Community Open House to be held on Tuesday, October 25th, from 5:30 to 9:00 p.m. in Salon B at the Cornwall Civic Complex with respect to the conceptual planning exercise that is commencing for the former Domtar site. The bilingual advertisement/invitation that was distributed at the meeting will be posted on the City's website as well as in the media. It will be the first out of 2 or 3 of these types of efforts conducted by Fotenn who have already begun meeting with developers. In a support role with this Non-Planning Act Open House, Fotenn has requested the participation of Waterfront member(s) to attend and/or facilitate in the Round Table discussions.

After a brief discussion, François Marineau volunteered to assist in the Francophone Round Table discussions.

ii) Update on

- Branding – Councillor Denis Carr

Councillor Denis Carr provided a brief overview of the signage exercise that will help to identify three separate areas of the City; Water Street, Downtown BIA and Le Village BIA. Copies of branding ideas/concepts were distributed to the Committee for feedback.

There was consensus amongst members that the concepts presented were excellent / positive and would provide the City of Cornwall with a sense of belonging.

Étienne Saint-Aubin suggested that other locations also be examined when consideration is given in the placement of these signs; for example, end of McConnell Avenue, and off of Highway 401. He added that he was not fond of the word “Cartier” and that another term should be used. He stated that a consistent French term for the word Waterfront is “Bord de l’eau” and that perhaps the term could be incorporated.

Councillor Denis Carr added that the City is presently talking of having signage off of Highway 401 and reassured members that before any signs are produced, the City will do its’ due diligence in consulting with the experts regarding the proper terminology of the bilingual signs. The same translation services used for the Historical Plaques will also be used for the new Branding signage.

General Manager of Planning, Development and Recreation, Mark Boileau added that new signs must also accommodate newcomers from the United States, and that the Federal government will most likely want to have a sign in place announcing “Welcome to Canada”.

Councillor Denis Carr advised that he would keep the Waterfront Committee updated on any progress made on the Branding work. As he had to leave the meeting early, he added that Councillor Elaine MacDonald, Chair of the Ad hoc Sesquicentennial Committee had recently obtained Council’s tentative approval to undertake a number of events and embellishments to mark Canada’s 150<sup>th</sup> Birthday in 2017; one of them being installing and running decorative lighting in parts of Lamoureux Park and other Waterfront locations. He added that if there is an interest from the Waterfront Committee to get involved in this venture, he would pass the information along to the Chair as well as both BIA’s who would welcome the support and knowledge of that particular project.

- Parking on Water Street – Étienne Saint-Aubin

Étienne Saint-Aubin provided an update on the matter of introducing parking on Water Street. In his observations, he urged a review take place on this particular issue as parking is currently prohibited on both sides of Water Street as it passes by Lamoureux Park.

He continued to say that it was difficult to grasp the rationale behind this current arrangement, and questioned, what is the City promoting and what are its' objectives. He suggested that the primary objective should be to draw/facilitate access to Lamoureux Park by allowing parking on the south side which would be consistent with a more modern approach to a quality of life consideration, and added that this would be a small step to make the Waterfront a friendlier place.

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau advised that it would be beneficial to have Staff provide additional background information as well as other comments from the City's traffic Engineer and Planning Division, prior to the Committee making a recommendation on this matter.

Councillor Denis Carr added that in a previous Centretown report it was suggested that parking be allowed on the south side of Water Street only during certain seasons, mainly spring, summer and early fall, and prohibiting parking in the winter in order to make snow clearing easier.

Stephen Alexander advised that a close destination in proximity to a parking area now makes that parking area more desirable because of that link. In his opinion there isn't a strong desire to have parking there to support the land uses. He added that if the objective is to have better access to the park, it is best to have bays or lay bys for example. He also had safety concerns with respect to pedestrians walking between parked cars. He added that if the primary objective is to calm traffic in that area, it would be beneficial to have the City Traffic Engineer's analysis.

Étienne Saint-Aubin replied that the traffic calming would not be the primary objective, but the by-product of the effort to make the Waterfront more welcoming.

François Marineau advised that when a study is undertaken on an issue, it is always best to have all the information on hand to clearly understand the reasoning that went behind the decisions taken. He added that he would vote against this proposal because of the impact it would have on Water Street, and listed three main reasons being; i) it would reduce the aesthetic value of the area as the boulevard is adjacent to a beautiful green space which the view would now be encumbered by cars and parking meters; ii) there could be additional risks of having vehicles colliding with pedestrians; and iii) parking spots may end up being taken by visitors of the condo residents living across the street, as opposed to tourists/people visiting the park.

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau agreed that there is a need to slow down traffic there. He added that the pocket of parking at the Museum is the most successful parking project the City had ever done, and that perhaps another example of that same type of parking along the Waterfront would not be a bad idea. He suggested the need to have in-house discussions on the matter with the Planning and Public Works Departments, as well as the City's Traffic Engineer.

After a further brief discussion, there was consensus of having Administration provide comments to the Committee by either the December or at the very latest by the January 2017 Waterfront meeting.

- **LED Lights Display in Lamoureux Park** – Bernie Terrence

Bernie Terrence provided a brief outline of a preliminary project to make Lamoureux Park more appealing/inviting by using LED accent lighting accentuated on certain trees and suggested using the following criteria: 1) Approval in principle from Council; 2) Develop preliminary cost estimates per light setting; 3) Start initial search for potential sponsors to help cover costs of planning, design, installation and operation; 4) Retain a local engineering firm to initiate the planning and design which would hopefully be covered by sponsors' donations; 5) Tender using local contractors; and 6) Monitor the first install and enjoy the results. He suggested the use of colourful lighting displays that would change every few minutes, such as the lighting used at the NAV Centre, and their placement in strategic locations. He added that at this time, he was only seeking support from the Waterfront Committee to proceed with the suggestions he has outlined. The next step will be for the Project Team (Eric Bergeron, Todd Bennett and himself), to present some rough cost estimates and possibly some visuals to the Committee.

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau advised that Council will receive a report at its' meeting of Monday, October 24<sup>th</sup> which will speak of a proposed winter festival in Lamoureux Park in celebration of Canada's Sesquicentennial. The Ad hoc Sesquicentennial Committee has established a list of proposed activities; one being the use of decorative lighting in the park with an estimated budget figure of \$60,000. He added that due to this proposed lighting element, it would be beneficial to communicate with the Sesquicentennial Committee to get all the information, so that projects are not duplicated.

There was consensus amongst the members that this proposed project initiative is a great idea and would create a wonderful atmosphere in the park.

For information, Ken Bedford advised that a Light Savers National LED Summit is taking place in Toronto on November 18th, 2016. This meeting will provide an opportunity for people to learn more about innovative Canadian and International projects in outdoor lighting systems. An email will be sent to the Committee if anyone is interested in attending.

**iii) Completed Flag Pole Installation at the Community Museum in the Wood House**

For information purposes, a thank you e-mail from the president of the Board of the SD&G Historical Society, Mr. Christopher Penney, was received by the Waterfront Committee with respect to the successful installation of the flag pole initiative at the Wood House Museum.

**iv) Road Weather Information System (RWIS) – Oct/Nov 2016 Installation**

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau provided an update with respect to the comments expressed at the last Waterfront Committee meeting. He advised that the concerns had been considered by Staff and that an alternate location was selected for the Road Weather Information System. The Sewage Treatment Plant is the new location chosen and meets the needs of the RWIS.

**v) 2017 Waterfront Capital Budget Request**

Ken Bedford advised that the Waterfront Capital Budget request is in-line with the continuation of the Pointe Maligne Public Park Enhancement project for a total of \$500,000 to match the Heritage Legacy Fund Application which has been submitted. Therefore, \$420,000 is the amount requested for the 2017 Capital Waterfront Budget (note: \$ 80,000 was allotted in the 2016 Waterfront Capital Budget to go towards this project). Under the Planning Administration Budget "Contracted Services" Category/Tag, \$ 30,000 will be suggested to go towards the updating of the present Waterfront Plan (last revised in 2007).

François Marineau advised that the action of asking for the full amount shows commitment on the City's part towards the Pointe Maligne Public Park Enhancement project.

Ken Bedford advised that the request for \$30,000 regarding updating of the present Waterfront Plan will be the first of two phases; the first being in 2017 and another equal request in 2018.

Étienne Saint-Aubin asked if there were any openings for Committees to attend and make presentations to the Budget Steering Committee.

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau replied that the public is welcome to attend and provide comments at the discretion of the Chair. The Budget Steering Committee will be reviewing the 2017 Operating and Capital Budget in the Council Chambers at City Hall, beginning Monday, November 14 through to Wednesday, November 16<sup>th</sup>, from 9 am to 4 pm.

**9) Notices of Motion:**

- i) Consideration to research the process/status of an Upper Level (i.e. Provincial/National) Government or International Level (i.e. Unesco World Heritage Site) historic designation for the Cornwall Canal (or parts thereof)**



Ken Bedford advised that this was a follow up to the request made by member Ted Castle with respect to conducting a preliminary research on the designation and status of the Cornwall Canal. Some background research determined that in 1929 the Canal was designated federally as a National Historic Event. The Canal is listed in the Municipal Registry as a site of historical interest, but it is not Provincially designated. He added that if there is interest in proceeding further and doing more research with respect to progressing with an application, this would be a great opportunity to partner up with the Municipal Heritage Committee "Heritage-Patrimoine Cornwall", as they have expertise and are mandated to get designations at a Provincial level.

Ted Castle stated that his main interest lies in the preservation and the re-use of the remaining portion of the Canal (from Brookdale Avenue to the Hydro Dam) which is presently decaying due to lack of maintenance. He added that as the former Domtar lands are being considered for development, there is great potential/opportunity there to grow a sophisticated urban living area. He stated he envisions the Cornwall Canal as a mini "Rideau Canal" and wishes it to be designated provincially as a site of Historic Interest and Importance.

G.M. of Planning, Development and Recreation Department Mark Boileau added that some historical elements of the Canal remain at the Cotton Mills, and should also be recognized.

François Marineau advised that the Cornwall Canal is an incredible resource, which tends to be undervalued when it comes to its' significance, therefore, he supports investigating further to seek designation. As a Site Planner for the last 30 years he is familiar with the Federal level designation process, and suggested that before proceeding with this initiative, that a review take place on the designations the City already has and capitalize on those. He suggested not spending time on a Unesco World Heritage Site Designation, as the Cornwall Canal is a great resource but does not have the same level of significance with other Unesco heritage sites around the world. He added there is merit in terms of a National district site designation, however there are currently 10 designated canals which some have multiple designations, and 8 associated events, and the question will be how many more are needed.

Étienne Saint-Aubin suggested that the point that needs to be emphasized is the wealth of Cornwall's Heritage and this area's special character.

Bernie Terrence suggested a way forward on this initiative is to develop a good use for the Canal, and come up with a project brief or business plan which would emphasize the Canal as being an historic resource that must be preserved and maintained. This plan would also demonstrate the steps taken on how the Canal will be used, and how the City proposes to proceed with that plan.

Stephen Alexander advised that a background study on the reopening and reuse of the Cornwall Canal as a waterway would be a massive undertaking.

Mary Joyce-Smith advised that as a Staff Resource of the Heritage Patrimoine-Cornwall Committee, she knows that they are looking for a site and project to work on for designation.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

The Heart of the City/Centertown Committee and the two BIA Committees are following the efforts of the Waterfront Committee to improve features on our waterfront. With the support of the Cornwall Waterfront Committee, the City of Cornwall and others the historic walking tour, complete with a series of historic plaques to mark interesting places and moments in our past, has been created. It is our hope that these developments will contribute to citizens' pride in our community and make the waterfront and downtown areas attractive to visitors.

We note, in particular, the plan to improve the portion of Lamoureux Park that is on Maligne Point. In general we wish to support this effort to beautify the point and attract increased use of this very pleasant portion of our waterfront.

However, we do not agree with the portion of the plan that involves putting a road on the point. We believe a road will detract from the peaceful nature of the park and ultimately destroy the character of the point. It will no longer be attractive or perhaps even possible to stroll quietly among the trees and lawns that exist now. We think it likely that visitors will stop their vehicles and perhaps park on the grass to enjoy the view and the surroundings. Vehicular traffic and a de facto parking lot will completely change the nature of Maligne Point and render it unattractive for all uses.

We understand that part of the idea was to make it possible for persons with limited mobility to enjoy a waterfront view. This is a laudable objective. We suggest that alternatives be considered to meet this objective without destroying Maligne Point. For instance handicapped parking spaces could be provided near the eastern end of the roadway that runs to the fence enclosing the harbour lands. Perhaps another could be considered just to the west of Maligne Point overlooking Marina 200.

Our group also wishes to remind Council that an important, although brief, moment in Canadian history unfolded at Maligne Point in the summer of 1849. That year thousands of refugees from the famines in Ireland arrived in Canada. Approximately 240 refugees landed there. Of those we are of the understanding that 53 died in the quarantine station. Bodies were stored, for a short time, in an out-building near the quarantine station itself. We also understand that at least one person, a medical doctor, died as a result of ministering to the sick. A small memorial to this migration has been erected beside our community museum. We suggest that a larger memorial, perhaps even a reproduction of the quarantine station, could be built at Maligne Point.

We acknowledge that considerably more research and costing would need to be done to advance these concepts. It seems likely to us that initial costs for a modest number of handicapped parking spaces, previously mentioned in this letter, as well as a memorial to the quarantine facility might be done for a similar or lesser cost than a roadway. And it might be a suitable way for Cornwall to mark Canada's sesquicentennial.
