Subject: Financial Statements and Variance Projections as of September 30, 2012

Background:

This report is respectfully submitted in accordance with the County's Budget Variance Reporting policy, and provides an updated projection to year-end based on expenditures and revenues to September 30, 2012 for Police Services.

Operating

- False alarm and parking fine revenue are currently at last year's pace. If fines and penalties continue at the current pace a negative variance of \$10,000 to \$15,000 will occur.
- The remaining provincial grants are expected later in the year
- The majority of the debt charges related to the Rockwood Operations Centre will be processed later in the year no variance is expected
- The mid-year OPP contract reconciliation of the County policing contract (see separate report) indicates that overall contract costs to June 30 are at \$7,857,079. This represents 47% of the County's 2012 Budget. Based on the two reconciliation credits received to date a favourable variance of \$200,000 to \$250,000 is anticipated.

Capital

- The Equipment for New Officers 2012 will be billed in October to complete this project.
- The Police Operations Centre in Aboyne has been operational since April 2011. There is additional work to be completed on the HVAC system. It is still expected to be completed \$275,000 under budget; the savings will be transferred back to the property reserve once the project is complete.
- The land has been purchased for the North Wellington OPP. The tender for construction is set to go out and close by the end of October. Staff anticipate bringing a tender report to November committee.
- The Live Scan Fingerprint pilot is moving ahead however there is no anticipated effective start date

Variances in the Police Budget at year-end will mainly relate to the calculation of the PSU credit, which over the last 5 years has ranged from a high of \$1.04 million in 2010 to a low of \$355,000 in 2008. Staff currently project an overall favourable variance for Police Services in 2012 of \$225,000 to \$275,000.

Recommendation:

Subject: Police Services Contract - 2nd Quarter reconciliation

Background:

As part of the contract for policing services, the County receives quarterly reconciliations of contract costs. The 2^{nd} quarter reconciliation for 2012 is attached, and is summarized on the table below.

Overall, contract costs are at 47.1% of the OPP contract estimate and at 47.5% of the County's budget for the contract. As expected, uniform salaries and benefits are running below the estimate, which is based on all constables being at the first class constable rate. Savings are shown in uniform salaries and civilian positions as 1 new constable and 1 new administrative position were filled in April and June respectively.

Contract payments are processed monthly based on the 2012 OPP contract estimate. As such the County is entitled to a credit of \$266,847 (or about \$88,949 per month for the months of April through July) which will be recognized on the next payment. Based on the two reconciliation payments received to date it is anticipated that year-end savings with respect to budgeted policing contract costs will range between \$200,000 and \$250,000.

NOTES TO STATEMENT

- 1) Uniformed salaries used for the reconciliation to actual costs are the January 1, 2011 salaries negotiated with the Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA). Civilian salaries are the salaries negotiated with the OPPA effective January 1, 2011. Effective dates of the one (1) Constable effective start date January 9, 2012 to June 30, 2012 (174/182 days), one (1) Detachment Administration Clerk effective start date April 2, 2012, pro-rated April 2, 2012 to June 30, 2012 (90/182 days), one (1) Constable effective start date April 6, 2012, pro-rated April 16, 2012 to June 30, 2012 (76/182 days) and one (1) Detachment Operations Clerk effective start date June 12, 2012, pro-rated June 12 to June 30, 2012 (19/182 days) and one (1) Constable effective start date June 11, 2012 pro-rated June 11, 2012 to June 30, 2012 (20/182 days).
- 2) Salary and overtime reconciliation by rank and classification are detailed on the attached Schedule "A". Salaries, benefits and other direct operating expenses have been calculated based on Full Time Equivalent Uniformed positions 108.68. Part-Time Constables are included in the shift premium calculations and in the overtime calculation. They are not entitled to the contractual payouts. They are entitled to certain benefits which are calculated at 19.6% of their salaries. Their positions are also taken into consideration for the calculation of other direct
- 3) Contractual Payouts are calculated using actual costs prorated for January 1 to June 30, 2012.
- 4) Shift Premium is calculated at \$600 per Sergeant and Constable and prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- 5) The benefit rates are 25.0% of salaries for uniformed officers, 24.9% for civilian staff, 19.6% for Uniform part-time staff, 19.5% for Civilian part-time staff and 2% for overtime payments.
- Communication Operator costs are calculated at \$5,003 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- Prisoner Guards / Expenses are calculated at \$1,223 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- Office Automation Support Salaries & Benefits are calculated at \$666 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- 9) Telephone Support & Benefits are calculated at \$118 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- Operation Support & Benefits are calculated at \$3,679 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days).
- 11) Ontario Shared Services (OSS) Payroll and Benefit charge eliminated effective January 1, 2012.
- 12) Other Direct Operating Expense items are calculated as summarized below. For the purpose of this reconciliation the annualized costs listed have been prorated (182/366) for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012.
- a) Communication Center is calculated at \$245 per uniform member.
- b) Operational Support is calculated at \$943 per uniformed member.
- c) RHQ Municipal Support is calculated at \$1,776 per uniformed member.
- d) Vehicle Usage is calculated at \$8,750 per uniformed member.
- e) Administrative Vehicle Usage calculated at an annualized cost calculated at \$9,788.
- f) Canine Vehicle Usage calculated at an annualized cost of \$23,169.
- g) Telephone Support & Benefits are calculated at \$118 per uniformed member, prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366
- h) Office Supplies are calculated at \$464 per uniformed member.
- i) These cost are charged for 15 uniform member working in the Mount Forest building location only as the balance of the officers are located in buildings owned and maintained by the municipality. Accommodation is calculated at \$481 per uniformed member and the cleaning contract is calculated at \$195 per uniformed member.
- j) Uniform & Equipment is calculated at \$1,202 per uniform officer. The uniform and equipment charge is not calculated for the one (1) Constable with an effective start date of January 9, 2012, one (1) Constable with an effective start date of April 16, 2012 and one (1) Constable with an effective start date June 11, 2012. In future years, the uniform and equipment maintenance expense will be charged for all uniform members. One (1) Sergeant with an effective date of May 16, 2011 charged for the period May 16, 2012 to June 30, 2012 (46/182 Davs). Uniform and equipment costs are for the two (2) Court Officers \$1.028.
- k) Mobile Radio Equipment Repair and Maintenance is calculated at \$625 per uniform officer and court officer. An additional cost of \$332 is charged for the Canine Constable.
- Office Automation is calculated at \$1,707 per uniformed member and includes one (1) additional laptop computer for a Sergeant at a cost of \$2,060 annually.
- m) Office Automation Civilian is calculated at \$1,985 per member based on 8.74 Detachment Administrative Clerk FTEs. The cost also includes an additional nine (9) additional desktops at an annualized cost of \$1,351 each.
- n) Semi-Annual Cost for the quarterly reconciliations charge based on the 2012 salary rate for the Financial Analyst (F03). This charge is not applicable to the semi-annual reconciliation only first and third-quarter reconciliations.
- o) Canine Training is calculated at \$3,000 annually.
- p) Kennel Maintenance is calculated at \$500 annually.
- q) Dog Maintenance is calculated at \$3,000 annually.
- t) OSS Financial Services Fee 1.15% of Total Other Direct Operating Expenses eliminated effective January 1, 2012.
- 13) A Provincial Services Usage (PSU) reduction of 3.68% of the actual policing cost is given to the municipality. This PSU compensates the municipality for the deployment of officers to other areas in response to investigations or other occurrences deemed to be provincial responsibilities.
- 14) The difference will appear on a separate credit note which will be forwarded to your municipality by Ontario Shared Services Bureau.

- 2) The overtime hours are accumulated by rank and classification and are charged at the appropriate hourly rate.
- 3) The full time equivalent (FTE) number of officers (Inspector / Staff Sergeant Detachment Commander, Staff Sergeant, Sergeant and Constables) were obtained by dividing the number of regular officer hours provided in each classification by the total number of regular officer hours. That percentage is multiplied by the number of positions in the contract. Actual salary dollars are then obtained by multiplying the FTE number by the annual salary for each classification. Salaries were then prorated for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012 (182/366 days). Overtime is the actual overtime for the period and is not prorated.

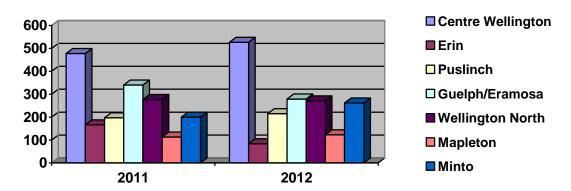

Dear Mayor / Reeve:

I take this opportunity to inform you that the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services (MCSCS) have updated the municipal policing Cost-Recovery Formula. The updated formula will be effective January 1, 2013. In the coming months, the OPP will be providing municipalities with the 2013 cost estimates, which will incorporate the updated Cost-Recovery Formula, as applicable. The salaries of detachment officers are not part of the Cost-Recovery Formula and are reconciled annually to actual costs incurred.

Previously, the MCSCS was directed by the government to review the formula costs every two years. The MCSCS is now authorized by Treasury Board/Management Board of Cabinet to update the Cost-Recovery Formula annually to ensure the cost recovery for OPP services provided to municipalities closely aligns with actual expenditures. Composed of per officer and civilian component costs to meet legislated requirements of the *Police Services Act*, the formula also includes operational support costs, such as vehicles, telecommunications, office automation and uniforms. A summary of the 2012 OPP Cost-Recovery Formula is attached to this letter. A detailed breakdown of the formula will form part of the updated "Understanding OPP Municipal Policing Costs" document, which will be forwarded to all municipalities in the coming weeks.

The OPP acknowledges that municipalities are concerned about the cost of policing services. However, the OPP is also confident that the services it provides continue to compare favourably to other police services in Ontario. We actively pursue cost efficiency measures in all areas of our organization.

As Commissioner, I assure you that the OPP will continue to provide municipalities with cost-effective and professional policing services in order to keep Ontario's communities safe and secure.

Subject: Update on Fortification By-Law

Background:

The Police Services Board has been trying to coordinate a common Fortification By-Law among all member municipalities in the County of Wellington since early 2006. The current status on which municipalities have a Fortification By-Law in place is set out in Schedule "A".

It was hoped that all members would pass a common version of a Fortification By-Law. To this end, the County Solicitor circulated a draft on August 3, 2012 and invited comments or agreement to same.

The various responses received on the draft By-Law indicate that all members agree to the draft but wish to see a protocol with the OPP attached to the By-Law or at least put into place as a formal policy. The OPP have indicated that they are not in favour of signing a protocol but are nevertheless fully committed to the principle of assisting members in all enforcement aspects of the By-Law.

The County Solicitor has advised that it is not necessary for a County wide By-Law to be passed to be able to enlist the OPP's services. It would be sufficient for the County, under the terms of the Service Agreement with the OPP, to advise the OPP that where a member municipality has passed a Fortification By-Law, the OPP will enforce the same and the OPP has indicated that they are in agreement that this would be sufficient to involve their services. It is therefore possible for some member municipalities to introduce relevant by-laws when they deem it appropriate.

In view of the fact that discussions with the member municipalities have been ongoing since 2006, and there is still no agreement on passing a common by-law or passing a by-law at all, the proposed recommendations are as follows:

Recommendations:

"THAT member municipalities are advised as follows:

- That while the OPP is not prepared to sign any Protocols with respect to enforcement of Fortification By-Laws, the OPP will assist in all respects in regard to such enforcement; and
- That each member municipality may individually determine if it wishes to have a Fortification By-Law in place; and

3. That as the Service Agreement between the County and the OPP provides that the OPP will assist in enforcing By-Laws that have been mutually agreed upon between the OPP and the County, the County will proceed to identify any Fortification By-Law enforced by the OPP working in cooperation with the Chief Building Officers pursuant to such By-Law.
