SAFETY WORK PLAN BACKGROUND

- First Ajax Community Safety Strategy (CSS) developed in 2008
- 89% of 66 recommendations have been addressed
- Ajax is considered a safe community, continued and integrated efforts will serve to maintain and improve this status
- The CSS Work Plan centres on continued efforts around awareness, education, intervention and enforcement
- One vision, each partner plays a part


WORK PLAN DEVELOPMENT METHODOLOGY


- Motor vehicle collisions over the past seven years have increased

 - ► Long term research studies






- Continued decrease in residential break and enters
- Education of residents through conventional mediums as well as social media

- Trends have shown thefts from motor vehicles increase during summer months
- Leading up to summer months an increase in proactive initiatives is required





- Ajax street level robbery trends have increased and decreased region-wide
- Strategies to improve these trends include after-school programming, education and awareness initiatives, proactive enforcement and an investigative focus

- Prevalence of anti-bullying and cyber-bullying
- Concern of identity theft (businesses)
- Greater growth and capacity needed to address social and recreational needs (programs and infrastructure)

VISION FOR A SAFE AJAX

"Ajax is a <u>welcoming</u> and <u>vibrant</u> community that embraces the principles of <u>respect, fairness and equity</u>: diverse neighbourhoods thrive and all residents have access to <u>engaging community based opportunities</u>. The Town continues to be a <u>safe place to live, work and play</u> due to the continued and focussed efforts of residents, the community and its agencies."

AN INTEGRATED APPROACH IN AJAX

Safe Neighbourhoods

- o Increase anti-bullying education and interventions and an awareness campaign on reducing the incidents of bullying and cyber-bullying use youth to develop and deliver the message

- Outreach, education and awareness of being a victim of street level robberies
- Investigate the feasibility of a dedicated Police Station in Ajax

NEXT STEPS

- Host Partnership meetings on a quarterly basis or more frequently as deemed necessary
- Gather baseline data to begin to measure performance and outcomes
- Report out annually and revisit the plan to ensure its relevance over time

ROADWAY SAFETY

Divisional RIDE

Each platoon strategically deploys RIDE on rotating schedule. Year-to-date the division has deployed RIDE on 26 plus occasions.

Directed Enforcement

3 primary enforcement corridors have been identified. All officers were encouraged to focus enforcement in these areas. (Salem Rd., Brock Rd., Brock/5th)

Distracted Driver Campaign

Several multiple day distracted driver campaigns have been conducted. Most recent in October yielded 275 infractions in 2 days.

Roadway Safety Coordinating Committee

A Roadway Safety Coordinating Committee involving the City of Pickering, Town of Ajax, Region of Durham, Ajax Pickering Roadwatch, & Traffic Services continues to meet approximately every 6 weeks.

Red-light Camera Research Project

A research team contracted by the Region of Durham are actively evaluating the feasibility of implementing red light cameras in the Region of Durham.



Hot Spot Comparison

Motor Vehicle Collision (MVC, red) and Traffic Enforcement (tickets, blue), in 2012 and 2013



Motor Vehicle Collisions (MVC)

MVCs in Ajax increased by 5% between 2012 and 2013.

Traffic enforcement covered broader areas in 2013 whereas the locations of MVCs were more concentrated than in the previous year.

Members of West Division developed a street level robbery prevention presentation that was presented to Grade 9 & 10 students at J. Clarke Richardson Secondary School in an effort to street proof these students from being a victim of this crime. DRAVIS officers assisted with the presentations to over 1000 students.

Property Crime

OUTCOME: A review of reports for 2012 and 2013 indicates that Theft from Motor Vehicle reports decreased over 60% in both Amberlea East and Duffins Bay neighbourhoods where the initiative was conducted. During the same time period, the neighbourhood of Major Oaks, where we were unable to conduct the initiative, had a much smaller decrease in reports.









Enbridge Oil Pipeline Line 9



Province's 7 Conditions

- Hydrostatic test of Line 9
- Independent 3rd party review of the risk and engineering assessments
- 3. Insurance coverage of at least \$1billion U.S.
- 4. Incorporate vulnerable areas and source protection plans into Enbridge's high consequence area and environmentally sensitive area maps
- Vulnerable areas be incorporated into Enbridge emergency response plans
- 6. Enbridge conduct emergency response exercises annually with all municipalities who want them
- 7. Enbridge publish an annual report on Line 9, including information about maintenance, spills and integrity testing

DurhamCLEAR's Draft Resolution

Is asking the Town to:

- 1. Support the 7 conditions set out by the Province
- Urge the Province to require the project undergo a full provincial environmental assessment if the NEB decision does not require Enbridge to substantially fulfill the 7 conditions
- 3. Urge the Province to use its influence to require that the entire width of Durham Region be designated a 'high consequence area' and the pipeline strengthened accordingly, due to the high concentration of water crossings and wetlands that the pipeline crosses, and the rapidly increasing population
