2016 Yearly Review

Elliot Lake Community Liaison Committee

Backgrounder

On October 24, 2011, the City of Elliot Lake Council, on a recommendation from the Economic Development Standing Committee, supported ELNOS by passing Resolution # 429/11. This resolution requested that the Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) complete an initial screening of the ELNOS region and learn more about the deep geological repository project for the long-term storage of used nuclear fuel.

On March 12, 2012, via Resolution # 100/12, the City of Elliot Lake Council approached the Nuclear Waste Management Organization to enter into the Learn More Process for Canada's plan for the long-term care of used nuclear fuel by requesting an initial screening. On August 27, a Summary Report was released to the City of Elliot Lake. By Resolution # 401/12, dated September 12, 2012, the City of Elliot Lake received the NWMO Summary Report. The Summary Report Initial Screening for Siting a Deep Geological Repository for Canada's Used Nuclear Fuel City of Elliot Lake is available at the NWMO APM Learn More office or on the Elliot Lake Community Liaison Committee website www.clcinfo.ca/eliiotlake.

Mayor and Council voted to enter into Step 3, also known as, the Preliminary Assessment of Potential Feasibility - Feasibility studies of the learn more process, by way of Resolution # 520/12 on December 10, 2012.

On March 11, 2013, by Resolution # 123/13, Council voted to establish a Community Liaison Committee, advertising for applicants who were interested in sitting on the Elliot Lake Nuclear Waste Community Liaison Committee (ELCLC). Potential committee members applied and 10 members were selected to fill the following categories: 5 public sector members, 4 sectoral representatives (medical, youth, business and seniors), as well as 1 member representing City Council. Regular monthly ELCL meetings then began. The ELCLC's first community newsletter, Volume 1, was distributed to every Elliot Lake household in July 2013.

By September 2013 the ELCLC Coordinator was hired and in October 2013 the Coordinator began working out of the NWMO Adaptive Phase Management Learn More office, located at 99 Spine Road, with regular part-time office hours. In September 2013, six ELCLC members attended an information session and tour of the Western Waste Management Facility for Used nuclear fuel.

On January 22, 2015, the City of Elliot Lake announced that it had been identified, by the NWMO, as a focus for a Phase 2 assessment project in the North Huron Area. It was also announced at that time that as an acknowledgement of the City of Elliot Lake's contribution to the implementation of Canada's plan for the long-term storage of nuclear waste, that the NWMO

would provide \$400,000 to the City for the establishment of a Community Well-Being Reserve Fund.

On February 12, 2015 City Council unanimously passed Resolution No. 90/15 that the City of Elliot Lake continue to learn more at Step 3 of the NWMO Site Selection Process.

ELCLC Mandate

- To engage, to inform and to listen to the community of Elliot Lake and the immediate neighbouring communities.
- To gather technical and social research on the subject of deep rock geological repositories for spent nuclear fuel and information related to the NWMO's Site Selection Process.
- To provide advice to the Economic Development Standing Committee and Council of the Municipality regarding the NWMO's Site Selection Process and Adaptive Phased Management.
- To consider the following in the pursuit of its mandate;
 - a) hiring of a coordinator/secretary
 - b) establishing an office space in the community [EP1]
 - c) Advertising ELCLC meetings and functions being planned
 - d) Organizing general Open House meetings from time-to-time for the public
 - e) Organizing information sessions with schools
 - f) Developing a website or cooperating with the City for use of the municipal website
 - Regularly providing information to community members and the neighbouring communities through their elected Councils
 - Establishing and maintaining contact with other communities in the siting process especially those in our region
 - i) Co-operating with other regional CLCs as appropriate

ELCLC 2013-2016

The Elliot Lake Nuclear Waste Community Liaison Committee (ELCLC) is a ten-member committee, formed in 2013 from Elliot Lake residents who showed interest in being on the committee and filled out the necessary application. The committee was appointed by council by way of resolution with the consideration of the mandate for the committee. The ELCLC committee is formed for the duration of a council term (4 Years).

Following the October 27th municipal election, Councillor Connie Nykyforak was appointed to the ELCLC to replace Councillor Ken Rastin, at the December 1, 2014 Council Meeting. Mayor Marchisella is an Ex-Officio member as he is with all Committees of Council. A request was posted in the local newspaper for interested community members to sit on the new 2015 ELCLC

and they were appointed at the January 5th, 2015 Special meeting of Council via Resolution No. 13/15. The members of the CLC will remain on the Committee for the duration of Council.

During the 2015 year 3 members of the ELCLC resigned due to personal reasons, again requests for interested community members to sit on the 2015 ELCLC were posted. Three new members were appointed throughout the year by Elliot Lake City Council.

In 2016 year one member of the ELCLC resigned due to personal reasons and again a request for interested community members to sit on the 2016 ELCLC was posted. One new member was appointed in May 2016 by Elliot Lake City Council.

All City of Elliot Lake Councillors are invited to attend all CLC meetings.

Norman Sandberg (NWMO Relationship Manager) regularly attends the monthly CLC meetings updating the committee and the public on events and NWMO news. In April 2016, Tammy Olson (former Blind River CLC Coordinator) was hired as the new Community Liaison Manager for this region. Tammy attends local functions and shares her time between the Elliot Lake and Blind River APM Learn More Centres. Tammy is the first direct local hire by the NWMO.

ELCLC Committee Meetings

The ELCLC committee continued to meet the third Tuesday of every month in 2016, with the exception of, July 19 (meeting cancelled), August 23 (fourth Tuesday of the month) and December 13 (second Tuesday of the month).

The ELCLC meetings, which are held in the second floor hearing room at 99 Spine Road, are public meetings and the ELCLC continues to encourage the public to attend. All monthly meetings are advertised on the Elliot Lake CLC Facebook page, on the calendar in the City of Elliot Lake website and on the Elliot Lake CLC's website. For most monthly meetings, additional

The Vice Chair presented the 2017 Learning Plan at the December 13, 2016 ELCLC meeting. Members of the ELCLC and the public were reminded that the Learning Plan is a living document, that can be changed and it will be reviewed in depth at the January CLC meeting. The Coordinator will take all suggestions for additions and deletions before the January 17th, 2017 meeting.

Youth Outreach Sub-Committee

As per the resolution 13/16 a Youth Outreach Sub-Committee was formed. The sub-committee consisted of the following 3 ELCLC members: Christian Giroux, Sirje Pomerleau and Pat Stirling. This sub-committee met with the ELCLC Coordinator and NWMO staff member, Tammy Olsen, on July 4, 2016 and the following recommendations came forward from that meeting:

- 1. That the Chair of the Elliot Lake CLC, or his designate, send a letter of request to the area elementary and high schools, requesting that he give a brief presentation at an upcoming staff meeting. That this letter be sent no later than the beginning of the school year and to request that the presentation be done at a meeting in September or October. The focus of these presentations is a brief overview of the CLC, its mandate and to speak about the Learn More Centre. Also, to speak of the possibility of upcoming presentations in the classrooms or field trips to the APM Learn More Centre. The Chair to also request that a NWMO representative accompany him at these presentations.
- 2. That the Chair send a request to the principals of the local schools asking that he or his designate to be put on the agenda for a brief presentation to their school's Parent Councils, once the 2016-17 Parent Councils are formed. The focus of these presentations is a brief overview of the CLC, its mandate and to speak about the Learn More Centre. The Chair to also request that a NWMO representative accompany him at these presentations

- 3. The Chair send a request to the principals of the two local high schools requesting that he or his designate make a brief presentation at a student council meeting.
- 4. The Chair send a request to Ms. Jocelyne Labreche requesting that he or his designate be placed on the agenda of an upcoming City of Elliot Lake Youth Committee meeting. The focus of the brief presentation is a brief overview of the CLC, its mandate and to speak about the Learn More Centre. The Chair to also request that a NWMO representative accompany him at these presentations.
- 5. To invite 2-3 high school aged students, with a chaperone, to attend an upcoming Dry Storage Tour. Chair to discuss this item with local high school principals and teachers at the beginning of the school year.
- 6. To liaise with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine and Science North on science camps that can be offered in the area during school vacations.
- 7. That the CLC request that the City of Elliot Lake appoint a youth representative to sit as a resource to the Elliot Lake Community Liaison Committee and to attend monthly CLC meeting.

At the August 23 2016, CLC meeting the following resolution was passed:

Resolution 28/16

At the beginning of September 2016, a letter from the CLC Chair was mailed to all 5 elementary schools and both high schools requesting that the CLC Chair make a brief presentation, on the CLC Committee, to school staff at upcoming staff meetings or Professional Development (PD) days.

The Chair and NWMO representative, Tammy Olsen, have made presentations to the following 2 schools: Villa Francaise des Jeunes Ecole Secondaire (November 1st) and Central Avenue Public School (November 25th). Other local schools will be contacted, by the Coordinator, in early 2017 to request an opportunity to make a presentation to the staff.

The Chair gave a brief presentation to the City of Elliot Lake Youth Committee on December 12th. Tammy Olsen also attended that presentation.

Members of the Elliot Lake and Blind River CLCs, Spanish Neighbouring CLC and the Township of the North Shore have been in dialogue with Dr. Doug Boreham, Northern Ontario School of Medicine, regarding the possibility of hosting summer science camps in the region. The Town of Blind River and Town of Spanish have both obtained municipal halls that can host camps in their communities and the Elliot Lake CLC has been in discussion with the Algoma District

School Board about using one of the local schools in July. This group will meet again with Dr. Boreham in the new year to discuss details of the science camp and sponsorship. These camps will be under the Northern Ontario School of Medicine, not the local CLCs or municipalities.

ELCLC Community Outreach

The office hours for the NWMO Learn More Centre in 2016 were as follows: Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays 9 am to 4:30 pm. The third Tuesdays of the month (CLC meeting nights) the hours were 1:30 pm to 9 pm. As of January 2, 2017, per the ELCLC 2017 budget, the office hours have been increased from 30 hours per week to 37.5 hours per week. The office is now open every Friday from 9 am to 4:30 pm in addition to Monday to Thursday. Tuesdays will continue to change based on the CLC meeting days.

During 2016, there were 953 visitors to the office. This does not include any visitor or student who attended the 2-day NWMO Open House or the 1-day CNSC Open House. These numbers would have been increased substantially to account for the number of public in attendance during these two events. The attendance numbers also do not include the public who attended the monthly CLC meetings which totaled 150 for 11 meetings. This averaged approximately 14 guests per meeting. The largest gathering of the public was at the December 13th CLC meeting which had 38 visitors in attendance, while the August 23rd meeting only hosted 4 members of the public. During the December 13th meeting the CLC elected to host a meet and greet social event prior to the short meeting. Many people attended not only from Elliot Lake but from Spanish, Township of the North Shore and Blind River. The attendees included Mayor Sue Jensen of Blind River and some councillors from Blind River and Township of the North Shore plus some members of the neighbouring CLCs from all 3 communities.

Acting on suggestions from the public, who attended CLC meetings regularly, the CLC purchased 8 very good-quality touch desktop microphones and a new mixer amplifier to accommodate the extra microphones. The CLC now has this equipment in addition to the 4 microphones, 1 RHF mic, an amplifier and 2 powerful speakers that were purchased in 2015. The aim of this new purchase was to assist everyone in hearing the committee members and guest speakers at the meetings. The additional microphones ensured that almost all of the committee members did not have to share microphones when speaking. The CLC kept the original more portable system which it has lent to the library for their bi-monthly movie afternoons and to Mississagi Park for their Lumberjack Days in August. The new system is still setup and removed at every monthly meeting by George Copeland of North Channel Music.

The configuration of the placement of the Committee in relation to the public has been also changed at many meetings to find the optimum arrangement, due to the increase in the public's attendance. There is also some doubt as to the availability of the large Smart Board that the CLC is presently using at its meetings once the White Mountain Building has been sold. To this end, the CLC will be purchasing a digital projector in January 2017. The City's IT Manager has been assisting the Coordinator to make sure a good quality projector is purchased.

Stack and Rack cards were still created for the CLC and the APM Learn More Centre in 2016. They are used to inform the public on the following information: CLC meeting dates (including the time and place), CLC members' names, the CLC mandate as well as contact information for the APM Learn More office. The cards are in the APM Learn More Centre, the display in the White Mountain Atrium, City Hall and the display at the Elliot Lake Welcome Centre.

In addition to the Stack and Rack cards being printed again, business cards will be created for the 10-member committee, the Mayor and the CLC Coordinator. Member's name will be on the front of the cards but the contact information will be the Coordinator's and the APM Learn More Centre's.

The CLC also voted at their August meeting to purchase shirts and jackets identifying them as members of the Elliot Lake Community Liaison Committee. This apparel was worn by the 3 members who attended the September CNS Conference.

The two community displays that were created in 2014, continue to be displayed throughout the community. A display has been erected in the White Mountain Atrium along with copies of current information and as always, a comment box. Additionally, the second display was at the Elliot Lake Family Health Team and on the first floor of the ELNOS building near the elevators. There have been approximately 210 additional copies of the brochure Moving Forward Together. Overview of Canada's Plan for the Long-Term Management of Used Nuclear Fuel and the new NWMO Project Description (released at the end of 2015) distributed from these display locations. This does not account for copies of the booklets being distributed using the NWMO displays at the Civic Centre, City Hall and the NWMO Learn More Centre. Using the portable community displays approximately 1160 copies of this brochure have been distributed since they were created in 2014. The comment box (which is located on the display table) is checked regularly with all comments and questions sent to the members of the ELCL, as well as Norman Sandberg, NWMO Relationship Manager and the NWMO.

CLC Coordinators Sharing Circle

Since the Blind River CLC does not presently have a CLC Coordinator, the Sharing Circle meetings have been suspended. Once a Coordinator has been hired, the members of this group hope to begin to get together again.

Due to lack of quorum, the meeting was cancelled, however the report was forwarded to the committee. The Chair intends to make a presentation to the EDSC early in 2017.

ELCLC invitations for NWMO participation

Elliot Lake and District Chamber of Commerce AGM

At the invitation of the ELCLC, Norman Sandberg, Relationship Manager, NWMO and Tammy Olsen, Community Liaison Manager, attended the Elliot Lake and District Chamber of Commerce Annual General Meeting along with their annual Trade Show in the Spring.

Tammy Olsen, attended the Elliot Lake Block Party and the annual City of Elliot Lake Drag Race and she assisted with the Elliot Lake Foodbank's December food drive.

They both attended the evening of the Santa Claus Parade at the Lester B. Pearson Civic Centre. Norm Sandberg also attended the City of Elliot Lake Winter Carnival at Mt. Dufour Ski Hill, These events, like the NWMO Open House, gave the NWMO representatives ample time to

speak to community members. There were also some other community events where they attended but the author of this report does not have all the details.

Local Service Clubs & Local Organizations

This year, the ELCLC Coordinator did not send letters, reminding them of possible NWMO presentations, to local community groups/organizations. There is a plan to send some letters out in early 2017 if there is some new information for the NWMO to share.

At the end of 2015 there were six outstanding requests for presentations by the NWMO. The NWMO did make presentations to: The First Baptist Church Seniors Group, the Elliot Lake Firefighters, and the Jewels of Harmony Women's Chorus. They will be making second presentation to Beta Sigma Phi Ladies Service Club in the January 2017. There have also been two requests for presentations in French, which the NWMO undertaking to accommodate these requests. The first request is at the through CLC member, Ray Racine and the second request is by the Centre de Victoria Pour Femmes.

During 2016, NWMO representatives also attended many other meetings and events around the community which were not facilitated by the Elliot Lake CLC. At some of the events they were attendees and at others they made presentations. They have had representatives as well as the APM Learn More Centre in the community since 2013 which has allowed them to create community involvement opportunities for themselves.

Open Houses and Tours

NWMO Open House

At the invitation of the ELCLC, on April 18 and 19, the NWMO hosted two Open Houses at the White Mountain building. Elliot Lake residents were able to ask questions and voice their concerns to a team of NWMO staff and experts. There were well over 150 members of the public attending along with 5 local schools sending approximately 208 students. The schools that participated were as follows: Elliot Lake Secondary School, Villa Francaise des Jeunes, Central Avenue Public School, Esten Park Public School, Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic School and Georges Vanier School. The NWMO was able to once again provide a bilingual

representative who was able to speak to the students in French enabling a class from Georges Vanier to attend the Open House. Although the logistics were difficult to handle with so many attendees the NWMO was able to accommodate all.

On the second day of the Open House the Elliot Lake Secondary School's Tourism and Hospitality class ran a barbecue that all visitors could enjoy. It was a good way for the students to put into practice some of the things that they had been taught during the semester. It was a win-win situation with many being able to enjoy hot food throughout the day and the class was able to raise some money.

Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission

At the request of the ELCLC, on October 17, 2016, The Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission (CNSC) hosted an Open house in the atrium of the White Mountain Building. Two sessions were held: one in the afternoon and another in the evening. Once again, the CNSC deemed it a "very successful" Open House with many community members attending. They have agreed to host another Open House in the community for 2017, if invited back by the ELCLC. For the first time, they also contacted the area schools offering presentations to students. They had a busy couple of days making presentations to all grade levels at some of the schools.

Tour of Western Waste Management Facility

In July and November, the ELCLC requested the opportunity for the new committee members and senior City Staff and councillors to tour the Western Waste Management Facility. NWMO organized the accommodations and paid for transportation for any committee member or councillor to attend the tour. In July 2016, City Staff attended one of the tours and new CLC member, Paul Torrance, attended the November 2016 tour.

Conferences

CLC members, Sirje Pomerleau, Connie Nykyforak (City Councillor), and ELCLC Resource, William Elliott, attended the Canadian Nuclear Society 2016 Conference in Ottawa in September, on behalf of the City of Elliot Lake. They made a brief presentation to the committee on their experience at the October CLC meeting.

Workshops and Training Opportunities

Aboriginal Cultural Competency Training with the OFIFC

At the request of the Elliot Land and Blind River CLCs the CLC Coordinator sent a request to the Ontario Federation of Indian Friendship Centre for continued training for the Elliot Lake and Blind River CLC members. The two committees will work together to host these workshops sharing the costs. The workshops are scheduled for April 2017 with parts 1 and 2 being offered.

NWMO Corporate Responsibility Program

After the January 22nd 2015 Phase 2 announcement, the NWMO announced a Corporate Responsibility Program. In 2016, through this program many local organizations and clubs along with the City (for its various community events) continue to be assisted by the NWMO in their fundraising efforts. As the project moves on the NWMO will retain this program and assist local organizations.

ELCLC website

The ELCLC website address is www.clcinfo.ca/elliotlake and is linked on the NWMO website, as well as the City of Elliot Lake website. The ELCLC website has up-to-date information on the committee. Information such as, committee members, meeting times, minutes, agendas, photos, newsletters, general information, upcoming events and past events, question and answer section, and a section to submit a comment or question. The website contains all the information needed for a community to learn more. The website is also available in French. Although the ELCLC would like the website to be also available in Ojibway this has still not been accomplished as of yet. Follow-up has been done with someone who thought they could do this but to-date it has not come to fruition.

ELCLC Newsletter

Three bilingual (French and English) newsletters were produced in 2016, Volume 9 in April, Volume 10 in August, Volume 11 in October. Volume 12 is scheduled to come out early in 2017. Approximately fifty-seven hundred copies were distributed via Canada Post to every home in Elliot Lake. Additional copies were available at the NWMO Learn More Office, ELNOS office, City Hall, and the Elliot Lake Welcome Centre, as well as, at every Learn More opportunity. All newsletters were posted to the ELCLC website in both official languages.

In Closing

The 2016 ELCLC has continued to provide Elliot Lake residents with

- opportunities to learn more about Canada's plan for the long-term care of used nuclear fuel and
- to inform the community on the key points of the site selection process.

It has continued to pave the way for community outreach, creating ideas and opportunities. It is continuing to explore ways to expand its Community Outreach. The Elliot Lake Community Liaison Committee members have volunteered time to attend monthly meetings and attend outreach functions. It is a committee dedicated to making information available to Elliot Lake's residents and a committee wanting to learn more about Canada's plan for the long-term care of used nuclear fuel. As the 2016 committee term comes to an end and a new term is about to begin, new goals will be set and the CLC Learning Plan will be put in motion with invitations

being extended to NorthWatch and the CNSC to do presentations in the first half of 2017. Additional invitations to guest speakers will be sent in the first quarter of 2017.

Indigenous Cultural Competency Training Cycle 1 and Cycle 2

Offered by: Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres

Does the CLC want the sessions offered by the OFIFC?

- If the CLC would like to book the OFIFC, then the following questions need to be answered.
 - a. Which week would we like?
 - Weeks suggested by the Friendship Centre if we wanted a full-day session, regardless of which cycle we choose.
 - Week of April 25th 2017 or
 - Week of May 23rd 2017
 - b. Would the CLC prefer to not offer a full day workshop but to offer it as a 3-hour 1/2 session?
 - i. Cost of full-day and a 3-hr sessions are the same \$1500.00 each.
 - ii. They can facilitate 2 3-hr sessions in a day.
 - If a full-day and a 3-hr session are asked for in the same day the cost would be an extra \$1000 on top of the 2 session fees, to accommodate a 2nd facilitator.

 - If this option is chosen, the CLC could use a meeting night for one of these ½ sessions, so we would either ask for a change of week or change our meeting night to a Tuesday in the proposed weeks (originally I asked for a week that was not a meeting week).

 - c. In 2015 Cycle 1 was offered in both Elliot Lake and Blind River the workshop was offered, in both communities, to educators and to the health care sector, as well as the CLC and municipal staff.
 - i. Which Cycle does the CLC want to offer in 2017?
 - Cycle 1 again, Cycle 2 only, Cycles 1 & 2
 - 2. The Blind River CLC are mulling over these questions as well at their next meeting, so depending on their decision, we could ask them if they would like this region to repeat cycle 1 and to offer Cycle 2 as well this time around (each session could be in a separate community, i.e. Cycle 1 in Elliot Lake and Cycle 2 in Blind River or vice versa)?
- 2. If the CLC wishes to not take the OFIFC training, does it want the Coordinator to research another organization who can offer this type of training as per the CLC Learning Plan?

Indigenous Cultural Competency Training: Cycle 1

About the training:

Indigenous Cultural Competency is an ongoing cycle of learning, a continuum. The intent of the OFIFC's Indigenous Cultural Competency is for organizations to obtain the necessary skills, knowledge, attitudes and values in order to foster meaningful and informed relationships with the Indigenous community.

Cycle 1, the first session developed and delivered by the OFIFC, frames understandings of Indigenous peoples by working through a series of four questions. "Who are Indigenous peoples?" "Where have they been?" "Where are they going?" Learning can then focus on answering, "what are my responsibilities?" These questions offer a critical pathway to action that re-centres 'culture,' informs relationship building, enhances organizational programs and policy, resulting in increased overall Cultural Competency.

Outcomes:

- Develop a critical analysis of contemporary issues in order to increase cultural competency
- Snow how confemporary issues are connected to historic context
- Explore how organizations and agencies can strengthen engagement with Indigenous peoples and organizations to provide relevant services
- Provide participants with a basic understanding of how to interact with Indigenous communities
- Share a culture-based framework for improving organizational cultural competence

Indigenous Cultural Competency Training: Cycle 2

About the training:

Indigenous Cultural Competency is an ongoing cycle of learning, a continuum. The intent of the OFIFC's Indigenous Cultural Competency is for organizations to obtain the necessary skills, knowledge, attitudes and values in order to foster meaningful and informed relationships with the Indigenous community.

Cycle 2 is the second session developed and delivered by the OFIFC and is intended to build from the learning of Cycle 1. In Cycle 1 learners will have increased understanding of the historical context of Indigenous peoples and the need to re-frame current relationships and increase Cultural Competency. Learning now shifts to tangible tools that demonstrate how culture has and continues to respond to the needs of Indigenous peoples. Learners will examine several case studies of cultural frameworks that have successfully responded to historic trauma within Indigenous communities.

Learning outcomes:

- Review Cycle 1- historical context, intergenerational trauma
- Explore the importance of resiliency and community as protective strategies for Indigenous peoples
- Provide participants with examples of how culture can inform. staff interactions with Indigenous peoples
- Examine a case study that demonstrates how culture can address Indigenous trauma on an organizational level, shaping the intent, design and implementation of programs, policies, and organizational
