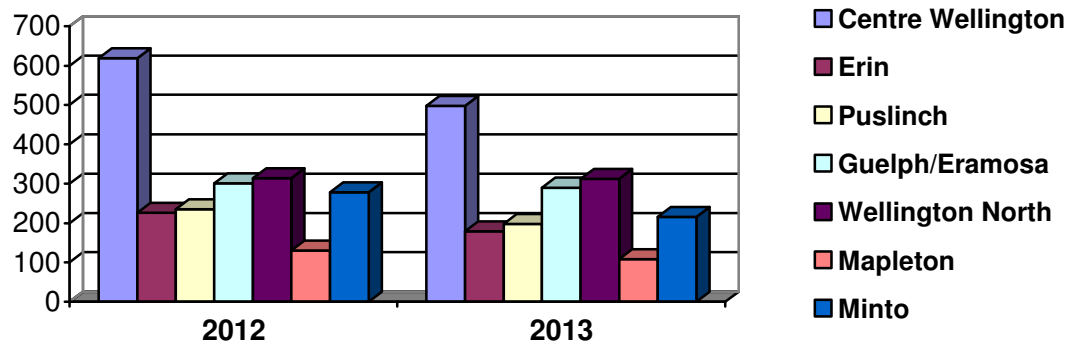

Wellington Road 34 at Smith Street in Puslinch Township

On Monday, June 17th Wellington County OPP were conducting radar patrol eastbound on Wellington Road 34 near Smith Road in Puslinch Township. Police observed one red motorcycle with a driver wearing a white leather jacket and a red helmet to be driving at a very high rate of speed. Police activated their radar and confirmed target speed was 106 kilometres an hour. Police activated their emergency lights and noticed the motorcycle accelerated in speed as it approached Wellington Road 34 at the Hanlon Expressway. At that time, there were six cars lined up at the intersection when police observed the motorcycle overtake them, fail to stop at a red light and continue northbound. With this manoeuvre, police ceased following the vehicle as it was too dangerous and it was evident that the motorcycle would not stop for police. Investigation continues to locate the driver.

Sideroad 20 and Sixth Line, Nichol Township

On the June 15th Police observed a Dodge matching the description of a suspect vehicle on Sideroad 20 and Sixth Line in Nichol Township. Police attempted a traffic stop, and the driver failed to stop. The Dodge drove at high rates of speed, up to 160km/hr. It passed in the oncoming lanes, and failed to stop for 2 stop signs. The Dodge narrowly missed some cyclists on 5th Line, causing them to pull off the road to avoid being struck. After 13 min and 12kms the pursuit was terminated. The suspect was located on a future date and subsequently charged.

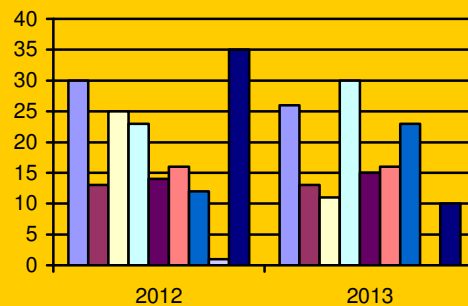

Date and Time: June 2, 2013

Location: Puslinch Township

Occurrence: Domestic Assault, Firearms

Rockwood OPP responded to a report of a domestic incident at a residence. The female victim has been assaulted by her husband. As the victim fled from the residence she heard gun shots. Containment was set up by uniform members and on duty ERT, canine was dispatched. Upon arrival canine was deployed to assist ERT with initial containment of residence. Canine was redeployed to arrest team and assisted TRU Team who made contact with and arrested the suspect.

01-Jun-13	Sgt R. SMITH	On June 1, 2013 Sgt Smith were dispatched to a domestic dispute where the female complainant advised that she had heard a gunshot upon leaving the residence. Sgt Smith communicated with his shift while enroute to ensure they maintained officer safety but that they were also able to maintain a visual on the residence. Once on scene, Sgt Smith was able to confirm that his officers had a perimeter set up around the residence and were maintaining a visual on all possible exits. Once in place, attempts to contact the residence via landline and cell phone were made. As a result of not being able to contact anyone in the residence, notifications were made to RDO and subsequently an Integrated Response attended. Sgt Smith continued to monitor the officers on his shift and once they were relieved by ERT members, expressed his concern for their wellbeing as they had been out in the pouring rain for an extended period of time. He ensured that they were able to get to a location where they could dry off and get warm. Throughout the remainder of the call, Sgt Smith relayed vital information to the Critical Incident Commander and the Command Post from the uniform members and Crime unit members. He maintained excellent communication to both groups throughout the duration of the incident. At the conclusion of the call, Sgt, Smith arranged for officers to take control of the arrested suspect and for an officer to hold the scene while waiting for a warrant. Sgt Smith returned to the detachment where he met with his shift members and held a debrief. He assisted in proper paperwork completion and submission. Finally, he submitted the required briefing note. It was noted that Sgt Smith's leadership to his shift was impressive during the call. He took officer safety very seriously by ensuring the proper steps were followed. He communicated well and led by example by working with his team to ensure all the required paperwork was complete and accurate.

06-Jun-13 Sgt. D. ANDERSON

On June 6, 2013 Sgt Anderson approached her supervisor regarding a current investigation in which she had some concerns around the release conditions of the individuals involved. There was a discrepancy as to whether a certain condition should have been included in the release. Based on the information provided from the investigating Sergeant, it was determined that the investigation was satisfactory as it stood but that more investigation needed to be completed on the suspicion of Elder Abuse. Sgt Anderson again approached her supervisor on June 7, 2013 after she had taken some initiative due to her concerns to look further into the investigation. Due to her efforts, significant information that was not previously provided. It prompted further follow up regarding possible Elder Abuse. It was also discovered that the Officer In Charge Undertaking was not signed by the accused female party. A discussion ensued where there was a difference of opinion whether or not the OIC Undertaking was in effect. Sgt Anderson was contacted at home to assist in supporting the documentation through the Criminal Code as to whether the release document was valid or not without the signature of the accused. Sgt Anderson did some research and provided the appropriate sections of the Criminal Code that were required to support that the release document was not valid. Due to Sgt Anderson's initiative and perseverance, this investigation was put into process and new information was brought forward. Her job knowledge in the case of release conditions and bail review were evident. Her assistance after hours was above and beyond what is normally expected. Her interest in ensuring a proper investigation is very much appreciated

23-Jun-13 PC M. POLAN

Supt Redmond happened upon a collision that was being investigated by PC Polan. The supt. Was very impressed with how PC Polan handled the victims and managed the scene. He stated that members having such positive interactions with the public are paramount to the overall success of the organization.

26-Jun-13 SGT. D. ANDERSON

Sgt Anderson was able to negotiate with Guelph Courts to provide the OPP space within the courts to carry out DNA warrants in the cell area. Prisoners no longer have to be transported back to Rockwood detachment to execute DNA warrants. This will be a great cost saving measure in both monetary values, saving money on gas and the cost of having officers guard the prisoner(s).

First Annual Veteran's Day

On June 6th the first Annual Veteran's Day was held at the Centre Wellington Administration Centre. The event invited retired police officers to attend the Detachment for a tour, food and a chance to sit down and talk with former co-workers and meet the new officers that have taken the reins in Wellington County. More than 30 members of the Guelph, Kitchener-Waterloo Chapter 6, OPPVA attended the event.

"WEE CAN HELP – Car seat tips for Wee Ones"

On June 13th & 14th a pilot car seat awareness campaign was launched in Drayton and Rockwood. A stop check/RIDE program was held in front of the fire halls with the intention of inspecting and correcting the car seat installation errors by having the driver/caregiver correct them on the spot. The intention of the event was not to charge drivers/caregivers, but to inform them on how to properly install car seats for child safety. In total there was 302 cars inspected and 51 car seats corrected and only one Provincial Offence Notice was issued as a result. The most commonly noted error was the child's five point harness being too loose, this is extremely dangerous as this harness keeps the child snug in their seat. In the event of a Motor Vehicle Collision a loose harness could result in whiplash injuries or worse, the child could possibly be ejected from their seat.

Sydney Crosby Jersey

On Friday 24 May 2013 at approximately 3:38 pm, a motor vehicle was stopped facing south at the intersection of Kertland Street and Church Street in the Town of Elora. The driver of the motor vehicle waited for several school kids from the Elora Public School to cross the road. The motor vehicle proceeded through the intersection and suddenly a child came running across the road in front of the vehicle. The motor vehicle struck the child and as result the boy became pinned under the engine of the vehicle. He was on his stomach with his head turned to the one side unable to move.

The boy was a student at Elora Public School. This day was the first day that he was allowed to walk home on his own from school without meeting his parents. His father arrived at the scene shortly after collision and crawled under the car to hold his hand and reassure him that he would be okay and that help was coming. Constable J. Peppler and F. Thornton were the first officers on the scene; Constable Peppler went under the car to speak with the victim. He was calm and his only worry was that his Sydney Crosby hockey jersey may get ruined. Both his father and Constable Peppler assured him that it was okay. He was given an OPP Bear and he held it tight as the Fire Department used the Jaws of Life to lift the car.

As soon as the car was lifted the EMS removed him from under the car and put him onto a back board and started to cut up his Sydney Crosby jersey. The victim then started to cry for his father because his jersey was now ruined. His father assured him that it was ok, he would get another one. He was checked for injuries and rushed to the hospital by ambulance, inside the ambulance he was calmed by the OPP bear.

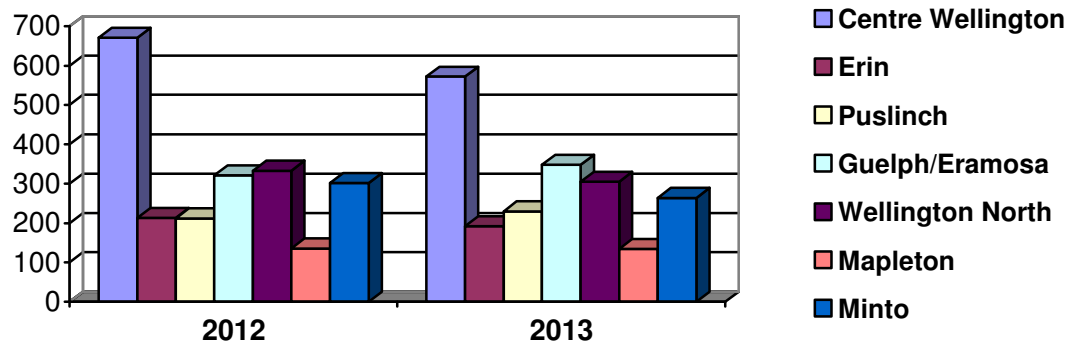

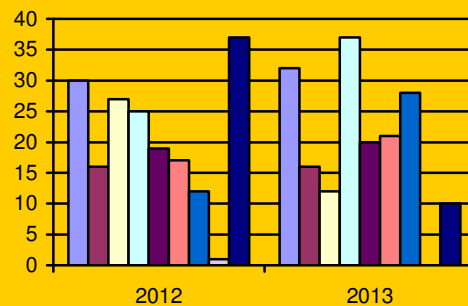

Tragedy at the Elora Gorge

On Wednesday July 10, 2013 at approximately 9:21 pm Wellington County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) received a report of three – 15 year old males who had been tubing on the Grand River in the Elora Gorge Conservation Area. The youths entered fast flowing, turbulent waters and as a result were separated from their tubes. Two of the youths managed to make it to shore safely, but one of youths was unaccounted for. Wellington County OPP officers, Canine and the Emergency Response Team (ERT) along with Centre Wellington Fire and Rescue, Guelph-Wellington Emergency Services (EMS) and Grand River Conservation Authority (GRCA) staff attended the scene and conducted an on-ground shoreline search for the missing youth with negative results. Due to weather conditions and safety concerns overnight the search was put off until the following morning when the search parties would be joined by the OPP Underwater Search and Recovery Unit (USRU) and aviation services.

On Thursday July 11, 2013 the search continued during daylight hours with additional support from the OPP USRU, the OPP Aviation Unit (Helicopter) and Wellington County Media officers. A very extensive search of the Elora Gorge and the Grand River water shed were searched extensively. The Grand River Conservation Authority assisted greatly by reducing water levels to make the search easier and provided a staging area for the boy's family and friends to gather inside the Elora Gorge Park.

On Sunday July 14, 2013 the body of the missing boy was found floating down stream near the Wiesenberg Bridge, Pilkington TWP, Wellington County. A post mortem was conducted.

OPP officers, along with Victim Services spent many hours with both the immediate and extended HOGG family during this difficult time. Many officers attended the visitation and provided support on the day of the funeral.

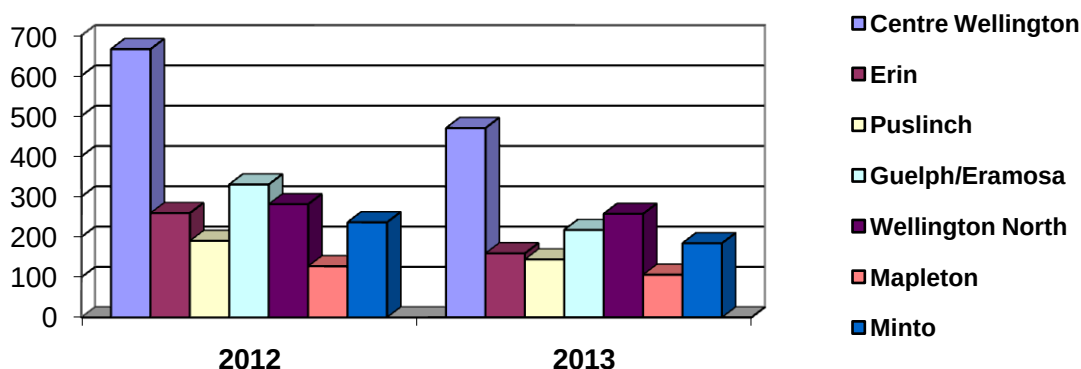

Traffic Initiatives

Automated Licence Plate Reader (ALPR)

Starting at the end of August, the Wellington County Traffic Unit is taking part in a Province wide test of a police cruiser equipped with an automated licence plate reader. Use of the new equipment has started and will continue for the coming weeks. In total 24 officers received training on how operate the automated licence plate reader. Early results indicate the ALPR car is identifying a number of licence plates in poor standing around the County.

R.I.D.E

The Wellington County Traffic Unit conducted a total of 51 R.I.D.E programs throughout the month of August, stopping and checking 6,424 vehicles. This resulted in 54 roadside tests, 12 licence suspension and four (4) Over 80 charges.

Marine Patrol

During the month of August the Wellington County Traffic Unit conducted 117.75 hours of marine patrol on Belwood, Conestogo, Puslinch and Guelph Lakes.

Collision Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED)

Provincial Constable Van Dyk completed a detailed CPTED report for County Road 44 in Guelph/Eramosa Township; an area of abnormally high collisions. The report created some recommendations which may assist Wellington County Roads as we work together to find possible solutions.

Back to School Patrols

A Back to School, "All Hands on Deck" traffic patrol strategy has been developed with saturation patrols of all County school zones commencing August 26th through September 6th. The focus is on high visibility and enforcement in hopes of ensuring a safe return to school for all students, teachers and their parents. The ALPR car has also assisted with this initiative.

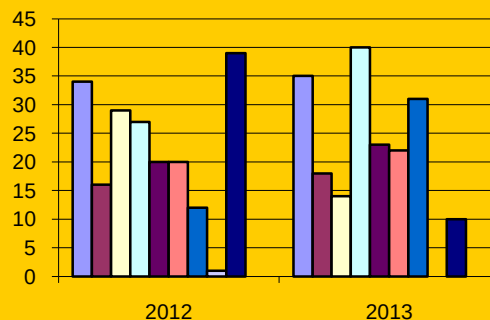

Date and Time: August 1, 2013

Location: Grey County

South Bruce OPP responded to a report of a single motor vehicle collision on Concession 14. The vehicle had suffered serious front end damage after striking a hydro pole. There was no one around the vehicle and it was not known what time the collision occurred. Police attended to speak with the registered owner, who reported that the vehicle had been stolen. Officers requested Canine Unit assistance with checking the surrounding area for injured parties. Dekker used to grid search adjacent bean field, around nearby sheds and residences on both sides of the road. No persons or evidence were located.

Date and Time: August 2, 2013

Location: Grey County

Owen Sound PD conducting CDSA investigation with assistance of OPP. Reasonable and Probable Grounds to believe a male suspect is trafficking cocaine to a motel in Grey County. Officers planned to arrest suspect as he arrived at his destination. Upon arrival at the motel the suspect fled in his vehicle through a golf course before fleeing on foot. After a 45 minute search the suspect surrendered to containment officers.

A Perth County OPP officer responded to a 911 call from a payphone, the female caller indicated that she was being assaulted. Upon arrival the officer found two males who had also been assaulted by the same suspect. Canine team attended and grid searched the perimeter around the residence. The track was lost when the trail became tangled in a fence/bush line. Officers received a sighting of two suspect 300m north of the area. Dekker brought to area of sighting, located a track leading northbound parallel with roadway, two suspects were located hiding in thick bushes at the edge of the road.

Canine Unit was dispatched after 1 1/2 yr. old child went missing from his residence. Child was last seen playing at the edge of the corn, which surrounds the residence. Uniform and Street Crime Officers quickly set up containment around the cornfield. Officer at south end of field heard child crying and was able to locate her 300m away from residence.

Noteworthy Information and Events

On 30th of August, 2013, members of Wellington County OPP, the OPP Organized Crime Enforcement Bureau (OCEB) Mount Forest Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU) and West Region Emergency Response Team (ERT) executed a CDSA Search Warrant on a side road, in the Town of Minto.

Prior to the execution of the CDSA Search Warrant DEU and ERT executed a General Warrant on the property. ERT remained on the property and kept observations on the outdoor marihuana grow operation while the CDSA Search was sought.

As a result of the execution of the Warrants, police revealed an outdoor marihuana grow operation that resulted in the seizure of 723 cannabis marihuana plants at various stages of growth.

The suspect of the investigation was not at the location at the time of the execution of the CDSA Search Warrant. A warrant will be sought for the accused's arrest.

Crime Stoppers celebrates 25 years as 'absolutely invaluable' to police

GUELPH — The statistics are impressive.

More than \$35 million in illicit drugs and stolen property off the streets. Nearly 2,200 criminal cases solved with more than 3,900 charges laid.

"When you look at the stats it really speaks to the value to the community," Insp. Scott Lawson, commander of the Wellington County OPP, said this week about Crime Stoppers of Guelph-Wellington, which is marking its 25th anniversary. "It's an absolutely invaluable program."

Since 1988, residents in the area have had an anonymous avenue for sharing information with police about crimes and suspicious activity.

"It gives us an avenue to follow up on tips where previously we might never have received that information at all," Guelph Police Chief Bryan Larkin said.

Crime Stoppers receives tips via a toll-free phone line or through a website, but the person providing the information is not asked to identify themselves.

Callers are given an individualized identification number so they can collect cash rewards if their information results in an arrest.

Rick Eller, chair of the local Crime Stoppers board, said to date more than \$125,000 has been handed out in Guelph-Wellington.

Eller said it is important not only that Crime Stoppers is anonymous, but that it is "not affiliated with the police in any way, ex-

cept that we pass information on to them. A lot of people think we are a branch of the police, but that's not true at all."

Lawson said once police receive the information "it's up to us to do the investigation around that tip to get a search warrant or make an arrest."

Larkin said the best source of information comes from people who are willing to put themselves forward and identify themselves, "but we do recognize we live in a time where people are afraid for one reason or another to come forward."

"This program allows people to share information with us who are afraid to do so publicly," the chief added.

Wellington County OPP make campaign to warn drivers against dangerous habits

GUELPH — In the world of law enforcement, they are known as the Big Four. And each is predictable, preventable and deadly.

Wellington County OPP unveiled a series of four road safety videos Tuesday, each targeting one of four driving behaviours that cause the most collisions and fatalities on our roads.

It's no secret that driving while distracted or impaired, driving aggressively or without a seatbelt are what imperil motorists the most. But police officials said it is vital to keep hammering home the message about these driving misdeeds, especially with the next generation of drivers.

About 75 people from Wellington County and several local police officials gathered at the Bookshelf Cinema for a premier of the videos, each about 40 seconds long.

The project is a collaboration between Ontario Provincial Police and Wellington County. The campaign is now available for viewing on YouTube via wellington.ca and opp.ca.

In one, the consequences of impaired driving are explored. In another, various forms of driver distraction, including text messaging and talking on a cellphone, lead to disastrous consequences. Another cautions area drivers to take extra care on roads frequented by horse-and-buggies, and the last gets behind the wheel of an aggressive driver who breaks all the rules of the road.

John Cain, chief superintendent of the OPP's West Region

Headquarters was on hand for the premiere. He said driving safety messages must be continually and consistently delivered, both to refresh the knowledge of seasoned drivers and to instil an attitude of care and attention in new drivers.

Speaking a few hours after another motor vehicle fatality in the county, Cain said most collisions and fatalities on our roads do not have to happen. They are preventable. Distraction, impairment, driving aggressively and failing to buckle up can all be avoided. That these behaviours continue is evidence that messaging must continue.

"The distracted driver, the speeding, the impaired driving crosses all segments of our operators," said Cain in an interview following the screening.

He said the videos will be posted on YouTube and various websites, broadcast through cable television, and screened in high schools.

"It is pretty unlimited where these can be used to target the audience," he said. Iron Cloud

The videos, he said, are short, succinct and pointed, and he believes they will have an impact on reducing the prevalence of the four most common causes of collisions.

"I think they drive home the message we were hoping to get out," he added.

Scott Lawson, Wellington County OPP detachment commander, said the provincial police and the county worked together on the video project as a way to reduce the number of collisions taking place in the region.

"We need to keep the messaging going around the Big Four," Lawson said.

He added that one video is dedicated to the specific driving realities in the northern part of the county, where horse-and-buggy operators are prevalent.

Collisions between motorized vehicles and horse-drawn ones are on the rise, and more care is needed when driving in those rural areas.

"What's disheartening from our perspective is these fatal collisions are preventable," Cain added.

"People can take the necessary steps so that it doesn't happen. We continue to see this carnage and to pick up after it, and have to go to families and tell them what happened."

Wellington-Halton Hills MPP Ted Arnott said in his commute to Queen's Park he constantly sees motorists operating mobile devices, even though it is against the law.

He agrees that we need to be consistently reminded of the dangers associated with driving while distracted, and about all other driving hazards as well.

"I would really like to thanks Wellington County staff, as well as OPP staff for putting together these public service videos, which will have the effect of enhancing safety on our highways without question," he said.

"We all need our reminders about the importance of highway safety."
